CEO Update - By Christine Fox, President-CEO

As the holidays draw near, we find ourselves busy with the hustle and bustle that comes with the season. This is true for Itasca-Mantrap

as well. This time of year is teeming with planning and preparing for the future. It all starts with our strategic plan which provides a general roadmap for the next three to five years.

With the intent of updating our 2018 strategic plan, Itasca-Mantrap hosted several strategic planning sessions in 2022. Our finalized plan has five objectives:

- 1. <u>Safety:</u> Everyone works safe, no one gets hurt.
- 2. Member Communication and Education: Further our reputation as a recognized trusted energy advisor. To power our community and empower or members.
- 3. <u>Technology:</u> Implement and utilize proven technologies that add value and move the cooperative forward.
- 4. Team Members: Foster an environment that attracts and retains exemplary Team Members. Promote a culture of mutual respect and trust through open and honest communication. Provide opportunities for Team Members to do their best through clear direction, education, training, crossfunctional learning, and teamwork.

5. <u>Positioning for the Future:</u> Ensure the ongoing viability and value of the cooperative.

For each of these objectives, we developed several specific and measurable initiatives.

The strategic plan is the guiding tool for our work plan, capital plan, marketing plan and finally, our budget.

The work plan is developed by our engineer with input from our operations team. This winter, we will establish long range (ten-year) and short range (three-year) plans. These plans will determine our summer construction projects and identify any substation upgrades/additions that need to be done.

Our capital plan is typically short-term (one year). However, with the long lead times we have been experiencing lately, we must plan beyond one year. The capital plan identifies the capital investment needed to accomplish the work plan and the strategic plan. The amount earmarked for capital investment for the year not only affects the budget by increasing depreciation expense but also cash management. The amount invested in capital will determine if and when we will need to borrow, creating another impact to the budget in the form of interest expense.

The annual marketing plan encompasses everything we do to promote Itasca-Mantrap and engage our members. Marketing initiatives in the strategic plan are included in the Marketing plan.

All these plans – work plans, capital plan, marketing plan – are then synthesized into an annual budget. Preparing the 2023 budget has been particularly challenging. The inflation figures we see in the headlines (seems like every day) have reached your cooperative. We have seen significant increases on all construction materials - up to 100 percent for some items. And just recently, we learned our wholesale power cost will increase six and a half percent. Wholesale power makes up 65 percent of our costs. The impact of this increase will have a significant effect on our budget. But, even with that news, we have reasons to be optimistic. Our kilowatt hour sales in 2022 increased over 30 percent giving us more revenue to offset fixed costs. We are still putting together the 2023 budget but remain tentatively hopeful that we will be able to keep rates flat.

Finally, the planning process requires a great deal of collaboration on the part of the Itasca-Mantrap team. I would be remiss if I did not give a shout out to them. They are top notch!!

Red Flags Rule - For your Protection

As many as nine million Americans have their identities stolen each year. As a result, the Federal Trade Commission implemented a regulation called the "Red Flags Rule." The Red Flags Rule requires businesses to develop a program to detect, prevent and minimize the damage that could result from identity theft.

As an Itasca-Mantrap Member, you may be asked to provide additional information and identification when you make inquiries on your account, such as verifying the last four digits of your social security number. While these practices may seem intrusive, please understand that these procedures are in place to protect your Member data and prevent the occurrence of identity theft.

Operation Round Up® Awards \$58,280

Thanks to the generosity of Itasca-Mantrap Members, the Itasca-Mantrap Operation Round Up® Trust Board recently awarded \$58,280 in Operation Round Up grants for 78 civic projects in the Itasca-Mantrap and surrounding area.

Operation Round Up, a charitable program unique to electric co-ops, provides financial assistance to non-profit or community-based organizations that demonstrate a commitment to enhancing the quality of life in the local area served by Itasca-Mantrap.

Five Ways to Fight the Winter Chill & Save Energy

We all have our favorite season. Some people love crisp, cool weather and bundling up under a favorite blanket, while others prefer the warm temperatures summer brings and all fun outdoor activities that go with it.

But there's one thing we can all agree on: high winter bills are never fun. Itasca-Mantrap is here to help you find ways to manage your home energy use and keep winter bills in check.

Here are five tips to help increase your home's energy efficiency this winter:

1.Mind the thermostat. This is one of the easiest ways to manage your home energy use. We recommend setting your thermostat to 68 degrees (or lower) when you're home. When you're sleeping or away for an extended period of time, try setting it between 58 and 62 degrees; there's no need to overheat your home when you're away.





- **2.Button up your home.** The Department of Energy estimates that air leaks account for 24-40 percent of the energy used for heating and cooling a home. Caulking and weather stripping around windows and doors is another simple, cost-effective way to increase comfort and save energy. If you can feel drafts while standing near a window or door, it likely needs to be sealed.
- **3.Use window coverings wisely.** Open your curtains during the day to allow natural sunlight in to warm your home. Close them at night to keep the cold, drafty air out. If you feel cold air around windows, consider hanging curtains or drapes in a thicker material; heavier window coverings can make a significant difference in blocking cold outdoor air.





- **4.Consider your approach to appliance use.** When combined, appliances and electronics account for a significant chunk of our home energy use, so assess how efficiently you're using them. For example, if you're running the dishwasher or clothes washer, only wash full loads. Look for electronic devices that consume energy even when they're not in use, like phone chargers or game consoles. Every little bit helps, so unplug them to save energy.
- **5.Think outside the box.** If you're still feeling chilly at home, think of other ways to warm up—beyond dialing up the thermostat. Add layers of clothing and bundle up under blankets. You can even add layers to your home! If you have hard-surface flooring, consider purchasing an area rug to block cold air that leaks in through the floor.

Energy Efficiency Tip of the Month

Blocked air vents force your heating system to work harder than necessary and increase pressure in your ductwork, which can cause cracks and leaks to form

Make sure all air vents are unobstructed from furniture, drapes or other items to ensure sufficient circulation throughout your home. If necessary, purchase a vent extender, which can be placed over a vent to redirect air flow from underneath furniture.




Team Member News
