

CEO Update - By Christine Fox, President-CEO

I'm not sure if you have noticed or not, but our power supplier, Great River Energy (GRE), has been receiving a great deal of negative press lately. It seems the media has focused

on the negative. After all, they do need to sell papers and it is human nature to focus on negative rather than positive news. Remember the last time you received one piece of negative feedback interspersed with a whole lot of positive feedback? If you are anything like me, you focused on the negative and had a lot of internal dialogue about how you could have done things better. Well, regarding GRE, I would like to shed some light (pun intended) on the positive.

GRE has been focused on the environment since long before I started at the Cooperative. In fact, it is embedded within their mission of providing reliable, affordable, and environmentally friendly electricity to its members. They and by extension, Itasca-Mantrap, met the Minnesota Renewable Energy Standard (30 percent by 2025) in 2017 - eight years early. Their latest projection is to meet the state's carbon reduction goal (80 percent by 2050) twenty-seven years early.

While GRE and Itasca-Mantrap are focused on the environment, we are also strategically focused on reliability. To achieve reliable service, we currently use 1,151 megawatt (MW) of baseload energy produced by coal, which works 24/7, and 1,570 MW of peaking plant

capacity for when we need a boost in our supply (think hot summer days or cold winter nights).

GRE and its members, Itasca-Mantrap included, recently made the decision to sell our last coal plant, Coal Creek Station (CCS) and purchase back a portion of the energy produced by it, rather than shut it down. We decided that weaning ourselves off coal was a much better alternative for our members than going "cold turkey". In my mind, this makes sense for a variety of reasons:


- Our energy produced from coal at CCS will be reduced from 1,151 MW to approximately 300 MW in 2023. That's a 74 percent reduction.
- Rainbow Energy (the purchaser of CCS)
 has committed to carbon capture and
 sequestration. GRE can terminate their
 supply contract if Rainbow does not
 comply, thus incentivizing Rainbow to
 invest in research and development
 of carbon capture technology. Once
 the technology is perfected, it can be
 shared with other coal burning facilities
 reducing CO2 emissions for all.
- Our electric supply will go from our current 55 percent carbon emitting resources to 28 percent carbon in 2023 and eventually to 94 percent carbonfree.
- We will maintain reliability while various new technologies are being developed for that purpose. Reliability is of great concern in a carbon-free world. Currently, we have nuclear and/ or batteries that are considered reliable resources. But GRE does not own any nuclear facilities and current battery technology will only keep the grid

supplied with energy for short spurts of time - minutes or hours rather than the days or weeks that are needed for times when the sun is not shining and/or the wind is not blowing. There are many scientists researching varied solutions to this reliability issue, but they all take time to develop. (By the way, GRE has invested in a company that is developing long-duration battery storage technology.)

- This strategy is more cost effective. By selling CCS rather than shutting it down, GRE will save \$130 million over the next 10-15 years. This savings is passed along to Itasca-Mantrap and, in turn, to our members. This can equate to a smaller increase, no increase or even a reduction in Itasca-Mantrap rates.
- Last, but not least, GRE will be saving the jobs of their employees, some of which have been running CCS for more than 40 years. Not only does this impact the employees but also the North Dakota community where these employees live.

So, although our critics, whose only focus is the environment, think of this as bad news, I believe the sale of CCS meets the competing objectives of providing reliable electricity at an affordable cost, caring for the livelihood of our employees, and caring for the environment. This is good news!

Items discussed or Board action taken:

Keep Utility Poles Clear

Keeping utility poles and electrical equipment free of signs, flags, and other foreign objects helps keep the community powered and our line crew safe.

It may seem harmless, but nails, staples, or other fasteners in utility poles present safety hazards to workers who have to climb the poles to repair or maintain the equipment. Sharp objects in the pole can lead to lineworkers snagging or piercing holes in their protective equipment, such as the rubber gloves that are meant to insulate workers from high voltage. Hanging things from utility poles also presents dangers to the community, putting individuals at risk of making accidental contact with energized power lines.

Safety is our number one priority. This is a reminder to do your part by keeping utility poles clear.



Keep utility poles free of signs, posters, flags, and other foreign objects.

Holiday LIGHTING Safety

Use only holiday lights that have been safety tested and have the **UL label**.





Before using, **check each strand** for broken sockets, frayed cords, or faulty plugs.

Don't string together more than **three** standard-sized incandescent sets of lights or you could **overload the circuit.**





Don't throw lights over tree branches that are **near power lines** and service connections.

Always unplug lights before

leaving your home or going to bed; a timer can help with this.







Sales Tax Exemption

Members who use electricity as their primary source of residential heat are exempt from paying taxes on the electricity purchased during the billing months of November through April. If more than one type of heat is used, electricity is not taxable only if it is the primary source of heat for the largest period of time during the heating season.

To apply for the sales tax exemption, Members must complete the exemption form, available at www.itasca-mantrap.com or in our office. If you have already applied for a sales tax exemption, there is no need to re-apply; your enrollment will automatically carry forward each year.

COOK UP ENERGY SAVINGS THIS HOLIDAY SEASON.

- Clean oven burners regularly.
- Match the pan size to the burner you're using.
- Use small appliances like slow cookers and toaster ovens when possible.
